Great Northern Greenway River Link/26th Ave N Overlook - Requesting \$3 million
Briefly, here is why the Parks Foundation urges the MRPC to support the Great Northern Greenway Overlook (S.F. 1586; H.F. 1533):

- The project is located directly on the Mississippi River and immediately adjacent to the Mississippi River Trail Bikeway where it intersects with 26th Ave N. in Minneapolis.
- The 26th Ave N. Overlook is a true "shovel-ready" project. If funded, the Minneapolis Park Board will begin project work in July 2018; construction of the overlook and pier will be complete in 2019.
- State funding for this project will be matched 2:1 by philanthropic funds secured by the Minneapolis Parks Foundation, which has committed an additional \$1.5 million for near-future trail expansion.
- This project addresses equity in access to the Mississippi River by turning a dead-end into a destination. It will bring to the North Side the same river access that the central and south Minneapolis residents long have enjoyed and offers lower-income minority neighborhoods such as Hawthorne and Jordan new opportunities to connect with the magnificent Mississippi River and the Great River Road.

Metropolitan Regional Parks - Requesting \$15 million

In addition to the 26th Ave N. project, the Minneapolis Parks Foundation encourages the Commission to support the \$15 million bond funding request for metropolitan regional parks. These are the state parks for the Twin Cities, serving 3 million people and hosting more than 47 million visits annually. Several projects along the Great River Road will benefit from fully funding the metro parks request, from Anoka Country, to Minneapolis, and St. Paul.



Legislative Fact Sheet

Great Northern Greenway River Link/26th Ave N Overlook & Pier

Project Description

This is a “shovel-ready” project pivotal to connecting the Grand Rounds at Wirth Park to the Mississippi River. Together with the site’s future regional trail expansion to the south, new features will make it a destination:

- A lighted amenitized pier, extending at street level over the river’s edge, would provide visual access to this natural resource and facilitate fishing.
- New plantings along the shoreline, roadway, and bike path would contribute to stormwater filtration while simultaneously establishing to a sense of place.

By locating the overlook at this juncture, the site opens a window on the North Bank to the Mississippi River national park. It builds on existing public assets and creates a much-needed reconnection of Farview Park and Nellie Stone Johnson School to the river.




